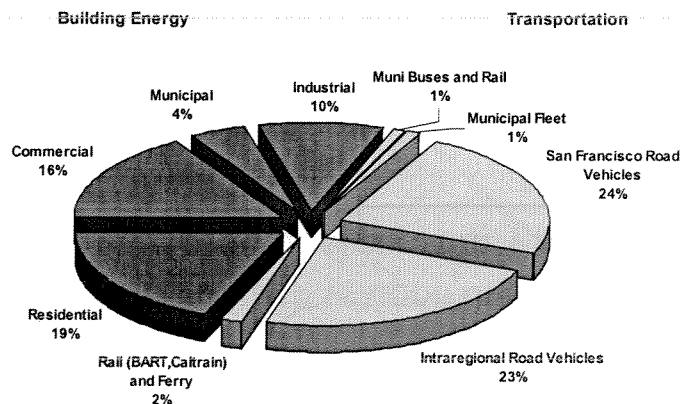


Overview of CAP Targets

- San Francisco adopted its Climate Action Plan in 2004
- Goal: Reduce GHG emissions by 20% below 1990 levels by the year 2012
- 3 target sectors: municipal, commercial, and residential
 - Commercial and residential more difficult to reach

San Francisco Greenhouse Gas Emissions, 1990

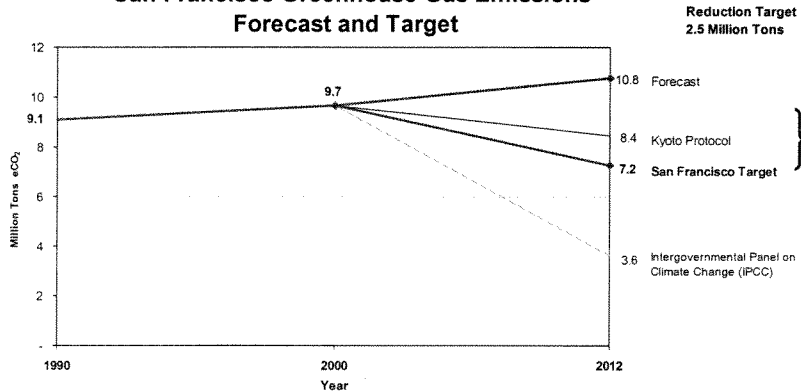


1990 Baseline Greenhouse Gas Emissions. Total = 9.1 million tons eCO₂ per year

Forecast and Target

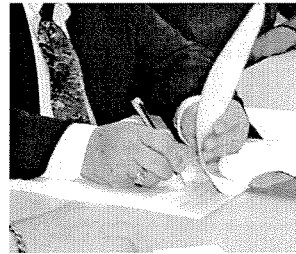


UN Global Compact Cities Program

- UN Global Compact is an international coalition of businesses committed to corporate social/environmental responsibility
- Cities can also sign on to program
- Purpose of Cities Program: use multi-sector partnerships to address difficult civic problems

UN Global Compact Cities Program (cont'd)

- SF signed onto the UN Global Compact Cities Program during WED2005
- SF is one of 16 cities participating globally in the Program; only participant in the U.S.
- The Bay Area Council is the Local Global Compact Secretariat
- Partnership to address GHG reductions in the business and residential sectors



Framing the SF Global Compact Project

- Work to Date
- Leveraging Resources
 - Bay Area Council and UN Global Compact
 - SF Businesses
- SF's Global Compact Initiative goal:
 - Create a model for reducing GHG emissions in the commercial and ultimately residential sectors



The Business Council on Climate Change (BC3)

The BC3 Is:

- A pilot project:
 - To inspire business leadership on climate change
- A toolkit:
 - For businesses to reduce their climate footprints
- A forum:
 - For businesses to take action and to share best practices
- An opportunity:
 - For businesses to gain recognition as environmental leaders



How Do Companies Join?

- Companies join by signing on to the 5 BC3 Principles
 - Being developed in conjunction with business leaders
 - Suggested action items

Draft Principles:

- **Principle One:**
We acknowledge our responsibility to minimize our impact on the climate system and support the development of a climate-friendly San Francisco Bay Area economy.
- **Principle Two:**
We will be active leaders in the San Francisco Bay Area community and adopt policies to address the issue of climate change within our corporate culture.



Principles (Cont'd)

- **Principle Three:**

We believe that climate change is a pressing problem that could have long-term consequences on the local, national and global economy, and that the Bay Area business community must play a key role in advocating action.

- **Principle Four:**

We believe all sectors of society need to work together to solve the problem of climate change.

- **Principle Five:**

Using a “comply or explain” approach, we will each report on our activities and progress towards reducing our climate footprint, and share best practices with other participating San Francisco Bay Area companies and the community.
